Promoting Quality Culture in Colleges of Higher Education: Role of Institutional System and Leadership

India is the third largest higher education system in the world today. According to list provided by UGC, there are 1019 universities in India as on 22<sup>nd</sup> November 2021. This includes Central universities, State universities, recognized national institutions like IITs, IIMs, IISc etc besides nearly 400 Private Universities, some of them set up by Corporate Leaders like Shiv Nadar, Azim Premji, Ambani, among others. However, majority of students are in Colleges numbering over 45,000 spread across the country. These institutions together account for over 20 million enrolments of students, almost equally divided between male and female. As many as 4 million students are enrolled in Indira Gandhi National Open University (IGNOU) and if we take into account the 13 State Open Universities and a large number of Intuitions of Distance and Open Learning (IDOL) of major universities, almost 7 to 8 million students, almost 35 to 40 percent of gross enrolment in India, could be in the Open Learning System.

It is equally important to note that out 1019 universities, only 381 (37%) are under Section 12(B) of UGC Act, eligible for receiving government grand in aid. It implies that 63% of universities do not receive any Central or State Government grant. The situation is almost the same in case of colleges as well. Not even 40% of colleges are listed under section 12(B). The governments have failed to allocate even 6 percent of GDP for education in India.

Despite being the third largest in system the world, the present Gross Enrolment Ratio in higher education in India is a mere 27%, against over 90 percent in UK and 86 percent in USA. Students are constrained to take admission despite wide variety of subsidies offered to students, besides reservation of seats for socially and economically weaker sections of the society. Reservation of seats varies from State to State. If it is 50 percent in some States, it goes to 70 percent in some other State. Young people prefer to enter the labour market to support their families, rather than enroll for higher education. Another reason could be the perceived deficiency in quality and relevance of the higher education system. The educated find it difficult to link their education to career opportunities. An indicator is the very high unemployment among the educated. The focus should be more on Quality than Quantity. If the quality and relevance of education offered by the institution is good, even those who plan to go abroad for higher studies will also come forward to seek admission in India.

Higher Education Institutions:
Towards Phronetic Vision Development

Shiv K Tripathi\*

Strategic changes are inevitable in all types of the organization including Higher Education Institutions (HEIs). In Indian higher education, the recent changes in the policy framework have made it essential to manage institutional changes for the desired transformation at the institutional level. While it is generally accepted belief that effective planning before implementation key to effective change management, the issue of aligning the institutional vision development. which is foundation to entire planning, often remains less explored. This article traces the need for contextually aligned vision development and explores the emerging issues, which need to be addressed in the vision development process. Based on the advances in the literature of 'practical wisdom' applications in management, the article presents a conceptual framework for 'Phronetic Vision Development (PVD)' in context of HEIs. The article is conceptual and based on review of literature. The suggested PVD steps are generic and can be adapted to any specific institutional context.

The transition from Millennium Development Goals (UN, 2015 a) to Sustainable Development Goals (UN, 2015 b) created a worldwide change wave in the development priorities. Post introduction of Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), there have been numerous initiatives at different levels ranging from new development frameworks by international development agencies to country-level policy reforms and changes; all with the broader objective of setting the development direction and pace to achieve 17 SDGs (UN, 2015 b, ibid.). The review of most of the country-level policy changes across countries and continents shows the prioritization of SDGs through policy reforms.

In the Indian context too, most of the post-2015 policy reform initiatives across different sectors have focused on embedding the SDG Goals and specific targets through proposed sector-specific changes. For example, two important national policies in the health and education sector in India i.e. National Health Policy 2017 (MHFW, 2017) and National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 (MHRD, 2020) respectively, both show the direction of the policy reforms are guided largely by the broader objective of accomplishing the SDGs. In order to effectively realize the policy level changes on the ground, the changes in regulations, systems, structures, processes, and culture are the essential requirements. Such mega-level change management requires strong multi-stakeholder collaboration and collective action at all levels.

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## National Research Foundation: Synergetic Role between Research, Policy, and Practice

The global scene encompasses social change and knowledge explosion. Indian educational system is necessary to keep pace with the changing process. The role of universities and research is to bring about reform to embrace changes. It is argued that the basic issues for education research are broad. But, issues embraced by the academic education research community are very few (Huang, 2014). The issue is not how to get our fair share of the research funds on offer, nor is it the targeting of priority areas to increase research productivity, nor is it to study some areas over others using some methodologies rather than others. On brainstorming these issues, we consider the extent to which educational research, and the universities in which research is centrally based, have a responsibility towards a provision of broad research. It is argued that education researchers, and universities, must find ways to be more inclusive and participatory in their practices, as well as recognize their changing role in knowledge creation. In this regard, an agency of the research community has a special role to emphasize the social, political, and economic aspects of higher education, research, and policy. There will be a changing role in society where knowledge can be created. Establishing a research foundation at the national level is well suited to play such a mediating role in expanding knowledge society. It can serve society in new and productive ways into the 21st Century.

Knowledge creation and research are critical to a nation's development. India to become the leader of a knowledge society will require a significant expansion of its research capabilities and output across disciplines. High-quality interdisciplinary research across fields must be done. Research in the arts and humanities, along with innovations in the sciences and social sciences are important for the progress of a nation.

#### A 'Forward Look' at Higher Education Research

There is a need for research to link to current policy and practice issues. The researchers are responsible for disseminating the findings to a range of target audiences. It is also vital that researchers are proactive in talking with policymakers and practitioners and communicating in a manner that is accessible to different audiences. The growing focus on practitioners as researchers provides a further opportunity to extend the impact of research on the educational sector. Recent drive-through 'quality mandate' has been stimulated

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
